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INTRODUCTION

No one likes to suffer. Yet life is not fair. We wonder why it seems that the worst people prosper and the vulnerable struggle through no fault of their own. Most people would love to believe that if and when pain comes their way they would be courageous examples, bearing it with strength, patience and hope.

'Why me?' has chapters that briefly try to examine these issues. Sandwiched between them are 12 stories of people who have been through the mill of suffering, yet have either found or proved God in life's toughest times. Men and women, young and old, from different nations and backgrounds, each has suffered; some lingeringly, others suddenly and dramatically. They have heard the voice of God, so could trust Him in the silences. They have found that faith is not based on explanations but on the promises of God. Their testimonies challenge us to listen to the Lord of all, who is never taken by surprise, but is at work in all circumstances, personal and global.

Just over 600 years before Jesus was born, the prophet Habakkuk was perplexed, knowing that his country was about to be invaded by the cruel Babylonians. He could not understand why God was allowing this, but as he prayed, waiting for God and listening to Him, Habakkuk sang words which have been immortalised and sung in public worship since.
